Clean Water

FRANK WATERS

Frank Water focuses on groups cut off from society by geography, poverty or caste. They include 100% of every community in their work, so that people take ownership over the water system that they've helped design and develop. In particular, Frank Water focus on the role of women and girls in communities as well as elderly and disabled people who are further marginalised by age, gender or health.

Frank Water programmes are diverse, and solutions depend on multiple factors including how the water is contaminated, where the source is, what the terrain is like etc. For some villages, they implement gravity fed systems where water runs down from a source at the top of the hill into a village where it's stored and used. For others, they install rainwater harvesting units that capture and filter rainfall for household use.

The charity works on a small scale and use research to help communities leverage more funds from local and national government.

They conduct their own research, work with external consultants who evaluate their programmes and create partnerships to build knowledge and develop proposals for action.
