ANNUAL REPORT 2016/17

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Penrith Rotary Charitable Trust Fund was established by Trust Deed on 23 November 2001 and was registered with the Charity Commissioners on 19 April 2002. The Trustees of the Trust Fund hold and apply monies of the Trust Fund to and for the relief of the poor and needy or such other charitable purposes as the Penrith Rotary Club shall in duly constituted meetings from time to time direct.

The Trustees of the Trust Fund are the Club's President, Secretary and Treasurer for the time being of the Club and they may co-opt any other Club members as Trustees as they consider necessary. The Club President changes annually on 1st July and the financial year of the Trust Fund is 1st July to 30th June. For purposes of the Inland Revenue, being a Trust Fund, the financial year is the tax year.

The Trustees do not receive any expenses or remuneration for undertaking this role and the disbursement of the monies within the Trust Fund is decided by the membership of the Club at duly constituted meetings.

Charitable income generation during this financial year was again successful and totaled £10,263 compared to £11,292 last year. The more substantial **net** amounts were raised by the following; – the **annual golf competition raised** £3953; **Trail Run** £1537; **Burns Night** £1100; **Penrith Swimmathon** £1062; members donations for **Rotary Foundation** £430; £331 was raised from a '**bag pack**' in a local store and £501 from a street collection for polio eradication; £264 was raised from members by their weekly fun '**Fines Box**'; the majority of the remaining income was raised from corporate sponsorship and members donations. Within the income generation indicated above Club members contributed a total of £1517

Total expenditure was £6,735 and the more major disbursements were made as follows:

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INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS

Rotary continues to be active in helping to relieve the plight of the disadvantaged of the world and works towards making the world a better place for the many who have no hope other than from our Rotary movement. In support of this ideal the following grants were made for overseas aid. £600 was used to purchase a **Shelter box** which contains one ten-person tent, ten sleeping bags and ancillary associated equipment for use when disasters occur throughout the world; £200 was given to the **Kaloko Trust UK** which works to advance education and to promote the healthcare of communities in rural Zambia through the development and support of a training centre, schools and health clinics; £250 was used for the purchase of **Aqua boxes** which each provide water purification systems to produce 1100 litres of water and the boxes are then sent by the charity to other voluntary organisations to be filled with added welfare aid items such as tools, clothes and hygiene equipment which are held for sending to any disaster in the world; **the Open Arms Malawi** charity, which provides love, shelter, food and medical care to orphaned and abandoned children in Malawi, one of the world's poorest countries with some one million orphaned children, was granted £400; £500 was given to the **Nepal Arughat Fund**, which is run by a GP in Cockermouth, and following the devastating earthquake in 2015 has rebuilt the local school in Khatriwara and supported the local hospital with medical training and equipment. **LEPRA**, which educates and treats sufferers of leprosy in India and Bangladesh, was granted £200 as was **Redr uk** which delivers training and technical help to relief organisations and their staff enabling them to respond to the needs of disaster hit communities. **REMIT**, which provides chemically impregnated nets, insecticides and medicine to prevent malaria in Tanzania, received £100

Since its formation in 1905 Rotary International has progressed to be the world's largest service organisation for business and professional people with some 1.2 million members in 168 countries. In 1917 Rotary formed the **Rotary Foundation** which sponsors international educational and humanitarian programmes

amounting to some US\$90 million annually. Merely as an example, the educational programmes include more than 1,300 Ambassadorial Scholarships for study in another land. Humanitarian programmes improve health care systems, support sustainable sources of food and water, and provide literacy and vocational training – particularly in developing countries. Members donated £485 to the Foundation.

The greatest project being undertaken by Rotary is its commitment to eradicate polio from the world. Started in 1985 the **polio eradication programme** provides funding for vaccine and transportation for mass immunization campaigns as well as support for social mobilization, surveillance, and laboratories to help carry out the final stages of global polio eradication. Rotary is a spearheading partner with the World Health Organisation, UNICEF, and US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention. Rotarians have raised over \$800 million in support and provided hundreds of thousands of volunteer hours. To date 2.5 billion children under five have received the polio vaccine, five million people who might otherwise be paralysed are walking today. In March 2014 India was declared polio free and also the South East Asian Region of 1.8 billion people in 11 countries was certified polio free. Polio infected nations have dropped from 125 to just 3, Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan. At the time of writing of this report (Nov. 2017) only 14 cases have occurred in 2017. UNICEF are hopeful to finally eradicate polio in the next few years. Rotary International and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has pledged to raise a further \$525 million towards this final phase **of polio eradication**, and Penrith Rotary donated a further £455, in addition to the £5000 in the eight previous years.

LOCAL PROJECTS

For many years Penrith Rotary has been very supportive of local young people and endeavour to lend the hand of Rotary to enable young people to fulfill their needs, to extend their aspirations, and to help them achieve their goals. £1170 was used to send a disabled young person, together with a carer, to the **Calvert Trust for the Disabled**. Each year we contribute to a day's outing for members of the **Eden District Mencap** and £555 was provided; the £300 'fun fines box' raised by members at their meetings was also given to Eden Mencap; £530 was used to fund the attendance of a senior school pupil on **Rotary's Youth Leadership Awards course**, which enables young people with potential to develop leadership skills; **Rotary's Life Education Caravan**, which is manned by two trained educators, visits junior schools within this Rotary District and delivers guidance on making healthy life style choices, received £400. The preferred charity of Rotary's District Governor (Preston to Scottish Border) raised funding and purchased two **Blood Bikes**, one for north Lancs and one for Cumbria, and we contributed £500 to the project. £300 was given to the doctors **BEEP** scheme based in Penrith and £100 each to **Eden Animal Rescue** and **Dogs4Good**. £200 funding was provided to three young persons undertaking **voluntary work overseas**

Penrith Rotary Club also works with the schools in the town, and particularly the two senior schools, to help with the development of pupils. From the Club's Benevolent Fund the sum of £641 was spent on a number of projects such as **Ready Steady Cook competition with** over 200 pupils taking part; **Youth Speaks**, developing

public speaking skills; **Young Linguist** and **Good Citizen**. £200 was used to provide financial support to three young people undertaking **voluntary work overseas**.

The accounts of the Trust for 2016/17, were approved by the members of Penrith Rotary Club at their Special General meeting held on 9th October 2017

There is a requirement of the Charity Commissioners that all charity trustees should periodically review the major risks to which their charity is exposed and the systems established to mitigate those risks. The Trustees of the Penrith Rotary Charitable Trust Fund are satisfied that the Trust is not exposed to any major risks and that their grant making is solely dependent on the extent of fundraising received. All accounting practices are in accord with the Charity Commissioners requirements.

This Trust Fund is very dependent on the local community for their support and generosity and the Trustees would like to take this opportunity of expressing sincere appreciation to all who contributed to this last successful year.
